

WHAT DO YOU WANT, EXACTLY?

A lot of folks in my parish check their phones during the General Intercessions. Others look out the window. For the Cheerios crowd, it's an opportunity to snack or use the rest room. Nothing personal. Sacred Scriptures have already been proclaimed, and the preacher has delivered his beautifully polished, or desperately overwrought, homily. The important work of the Mass between now and Holy Communion seems satisfied. So it feels like a good time to see what else might be going on or to take a break.

But the General Intercessions are the people's prayer! you protest. Why does the community appear uninvested? Like I said, it's nothing personal. Literally. In some parishes these petitions are lifted directly from a service without a tad of local editing. Or the writer on the liturgy committee may be a bit too wedded to the trite formula to pray for the World, the Church, the Sick, and One Other Thing. So while the "prayer of the faithful" may be the communal prayer, it's hardly THIS community's prayer. It may only incidentally reflect what's going on in the world this week, as well. Something hopeful or devastating that happened just this morning, locally or globally: Does it get a mention?

Even if the prayers used by your community are pure poetry and updated with the news of the hour, there may be another, simpler barrier to investment. This woman's daughter is sick. That man just lost his job. This teenager doesn't give a rip about what's going on in the Middle East. That couple is heading down a bitter road toward divorce. Their prayers, and so many others, encompass very specific scenarios that no writer can possibly anticipate. So unless your parish has a Charismatic bent and is willing to raise row-by-row individual petitions to the heavens, the General Intercessions will continue to be, in a lot of parishes, a chance for many to shoot off a text about brunch.

Jesus understood the deeply personal and specific nature of prayer. When he stepped aside to pray, the disciples waited till he finished to interrupt him. They didn't join him. Maybe they were scared to! Jesus knew what he was doing, and they didn't. Finally they got up the nerve to ask for advice. That advice, which we call the Lord's Prayer, is a blueprint for believers. Address God intimately. Praise God and declare your faith in Kingdom coming. Ask for what you need, both materially and spiritually. And, as the following parable makes obvious, don't give up. God will answer! The intimate debate between Abraham and God is an example of how bold we're allowed and expected to be. If it's important, keep asking.



DON'T EAT IT

The best things in life—aren't things. Somewhere deep down, many of us suspect this. Some may even accept it and strive to live in the direction of higher values. However, the world is chock full of wonderful, wonderful things and we all want some of them. Maybe lots of them. I know I do.

I get that world peace is important. And I want to save the environment and clean up our energy, water, and food supply. Justice is a top-shelf priority, no doubt about it. Ending world hunger, preventing disease—I'm on board, count me in. A loving family and the company of friends is really good, certainly more vital to existence than having a new car. But I want the car, too. And a better kitchen. A bigger apartment, actually. A niftier vacation than the one I can presently afford. Like the one in the magazines.

We ruminates in this way often, daydream about having enough money to get all the stuff. And if we have enough money, we find our daydream expanding to a new horizon, creating even more pseudo-needs. As every rich person will tell you, the only thing better than a million dollars is two million.

Most folks in the Sunday assembly know that, in the end, Qoheleth is right. It's all vanity, all the striving and buying, stockpiling and yearning. A garage full of toys isn't happiness. But it sure sounds like happiness. If we're destined to be grass that springs up in the morning, then let it be a long morning, and let's have our time in the sun! The society around us, of course, is no help at all in forming more reasonable and durable values. This culture is established on buying and selling. It has to arouse our conspicuous consumption to survive and thrive.

Maybe we have to stop calling ourselves consumers. That's not who we are; that's who sellers want us to be. The identity of a consumer is deceptive and dangerous to our souls. Resist the name. Disavow it when you hear it. Jesus has a more frank name for a consumer: greedy. Since consumption literally means feeding a hunger, a consumer is a person who lets hunger dictate every decision. This sort of greed inflates us, even as it inflates our homes and garages, our bodies and our dissatisfaction with what we already have. The more we get, the more we want. Greed inflates everything but our spirits. No matter what we purchase and possess, it's always going to be like that second piece of pie: It seemed like a good idea at the time. It tasted good in the moment. But the reality of the second piece never matches up to the idea. It just makes us sick.

We are so very thankful to all those men and women who have generously given of their time over the years to assist in this ministry.

Since many of our parishioners tend to go away during the summer months, we are waiting until the early fall to hold a workshop and retreat for those being called to serve in this ministry. **Plans are now being made to hold this workshop and retreat on Saturday, September 10, 2016.** Once the process of discernment and formation is complete, our Pastor will forward the names of those being called to this ministry to the Archbishop for (re)appointment and commissioning.

In the meantime, according to their availability, those who have been serving as Communion Ministers during the last three years are kindly asked to continue serving through the summer months. In cases of real necessity, our Pastor may also depute other suitable members of the faithful to assist with the distribution Holy Communion on a individual occasion. **Also, those hoping to serve or continue in this ministry especially to the sick and the shut-in are asked to contact our pastoral assistant, Sharon, to make arrangement over the summer months to complete police checks and other necessary safe environment requirements.**

God willing, by sometime in the fall the situation will be regularized with a new group of *Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion* commissioned in the appropriate liturgical rite by mandate of our Archbishop.

SJXXIII BUILDING AND MAINTENANCE COMMITTEE UPDATE

Your parish building and maintenance committee has been pleased to complete following items in 2016: (1) renovation of the reconciliation room including a new glass door to conform to safe environment standards, (2) relocation of the choir, and (3) parking lot remediation and sweeping.

As I'm sure most of you know, we have a good building. However, at 49 years of age it is starting to need some major maintenance and repair. To maintain the integrity of the *building envelope* (i.e. its outer shell), we need to replace many broken and cracked bricks and re-point the brick and decorative masonry trim panels. We have a quote for this work and would like to proceed prior to another freeze season. The cost of this work will be approximately **\$12,500.00**. [So far, as of July 17th, a total of \$2,400.00 has been donated.]

We are hoping to proceed with this work in September 2016, but we cannot proceed until we receive funds specific to this project. Therefore, I ask for your generosity towards this project. **If you are able to help, please make your cheque payable to "St. John XXIII Parish" and indicate that your donation is to be used towards "Building Envelope Repair"**. Thank you for considering this important request.
